This is a copy of the final judgment in the civil case that was initiated by Savino Falco against Brinson Co. and Brinson Co.-Midwest. The judgment in and of itself is fairly ordinary. Falco lost, Brinson Co. won.

The interesting part of this judgment is that it was handed down after a Directed Verdict, i.e., the defendant, Brinson, did not have to testify because the plaintiff, Falco, could not sufficiently prove his case on his complaint of retaliatory discharge.

FYI – Directed Verdicts are very rare
